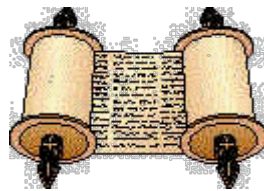

Shalom from Santa Rosa, California!

This year, Hallel Fellowship of Santa Rosa will again be hosting a Sukkot celebration, worshipping God on His Feast of Tabernacles!

God's Word explains that our Heavenly Father wants us to rejoice before him at this appointed time:

Leviticus 23:39

"So beginning with the fifteenth day of the seventh month, after you have gathered the crops of the land, celebrate the festival to the Lord for seven days; the first day is a day of rest, and the eighth day also is a day of rest. 40 On the first day you are to take choice fruit from the trees, and palm fronds, leafy branches and poplars, and rejoice before the Lord your God for seven days. 41 Celebrate this as a festival to the Lord for seven days each year. This is to be a lasting ordinance for the generations to come; celebrate it in the seventh month. 42 Live in booths (sukkahs) for seven days: All native-born Israelites are to live in booths 43 so your descendants will know that I had the Israelites live in booths when I brought them out of Egypt. I am the Lord your God."

The 15th day of the seventh biblical month begins at sundown September 24, 2010. The last day of the Feast, which is a High Holy Day, is October 2, 2010.

If you are interested in learning about the significance of these days or God's other appointed times, come celebrate and learn with us. We will celebrate with food, songs, dancing and of course plenty of teaching and prayer.

Packets outlining what we have planned will be available upon request. We sincerely hope you join us for all or part of this Festival and take part in God's "Harvest of Blessings".

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There is no registration fee this year – The costs are as follows:

These prices include breakfast, lunch and dinner for each day. Beginning September 24th with our Welcome Dinner, ending October 2nd (any leftovers will be served Sunday AM, Oct 3rd for the cleanup crew) Breakfast only will be served on our FREE DAY. Cabins sleep 10 and have cots and pads, but you will need your own bedding. Cabins will be reserved and assigned on a first come first serve basis, so register ASAP. An open grassy field for tents is also available for those who do not desire a cabin. Please visit our website for pictures of the site. The site is reserved from September 22nd (for set up) thru October 3rd (clean up) – all help is appreciated!

There will also be a Wedding Celebration on the night of October 1, 2010. Seating for this event is limited, so we will need your reservation returned by September 12, 2010.

Hallel Fellowship will be serving a Welcome Dinner between 4:00 and 6:00 p.m. on September 24th and 3 meals a day (cold meals on Shabbat). Throughout the Feast, we will supply paper plates, utensils and paper products. We also advise that you bring plenty of bottled drinking water. The water at the camp site has been tested by the Health Department and determined safe, but does not taste very good.

We will be assigning "Kitchen Teams" for each day once we have a total head count. The more people the fewer days we each will need to serve. The "KT" for the day will be responsible for all cooking, prep and clean up for that day. There will be a "Lead" for each team for work assignments, meal organization, etc. The Food Building will be locked and off limits to everyone except the "Team" for the day - so plan to bring your own ice chests for personal items to keep in your cabins or tents.

What to plan for:

1. Cabins have 10 bunks per cabin, but no lighting. You will need to bring your own bedding, towels, lanterns, Flash lights, table etc.
2. Bring your own chairs for Camp Fire sitting.
3. The Food Cabin will be off limits for personal use, so bring your own Ice chest for your private items and it will keep the mice out of your stuff too.
4. The Ladies Bathroom/Shower building is in the middle of the camp, so bring easy slip on shoes for night time needs and flip flops for the showers (slippery floors and mats are rough on feet)
5. This is heavily wooded sight, and dusk comes early this time of year so Flash lights are a necessity.
6. Tent pitching area is an open grassy field across the creek from the camp – we plan to have adequate lighting for the path this year, a hand rail for the steps and a port-a-potty on that side of the camp for night time use.
7. Announcements will be made each morning at breakfast to highlight the day's activities and address any issues.

Reminders for Changes & New rules:

1. Curfew set by the Camp administrators - 10pm
2. We will be serving all 3 meals this year, breakfast, lunch and dinner – We will focus on healthy and organic foods. A menu will be posted for the week and we will try to offer a variety at each meal, but special requests and personal preferences will need to remain your own responsibility.
3. Food cabin and refrigerators will be locked and off limits for private use. Too many items were mis-appropriated last year and led to major shortages for meal preparations. Plan to bring your own ice chests for personal use in your cabins or tents. Keep in mind, mice can be attracted by improperly stored foods.
4. To avoid a certain few from working the entire feast we will be assigning “Kitchen Teams” for each day – that team will be responsible for all cooking, food prep and clean up for that entire day. There will be a team leader who will have the menu plan for the day and organize the team efforts. Children old enough to assist will be asked to serve alongside their parents, on their scheduled days. The teams will be assessed once we have a head count confirmed – the more people in attendance the less days we each have to serve. Please be conscientious of this responsibility for service – when you drop the ball another of God's children must pick up the slack for you. There will of course be exemptions for nursing mothers and the elderly. Please see Carmel or Kathy for exemptions.
5. In order to set a positive example for guests and children in attendance, alcohol consumption while allowed should remain low-key. While we are commanded to celebrate HIS feasts with joy and strong spirits, please refrain from over indulgence.
6. Additional cabins are available this year. Cabins will be reserved and assigned this year giving preference to families with small children, elderly and special needs. Please register ASAP if you fall into these groups. Cabin assignments will be handled by Carmel so call her at (510) 317-0307 or email at cviadelmar@comcast.net for accommodations. This is for Cabin assignments only – tent space is on a first come first serve basis.
7. We have an “it takes a village” mentality when it comes to children and their behavior. As their parents, you will be expected to watch over their activity while attending this feast. You as parents will be responsible for any damage done by your children. Children also need to be aware they are expected to listen and respond to correction from any adults who witness ill or destructive behavior. Disrespect or foul mouths will not be tolerated and violators may be asked to leave the site.

DIRECTIONS:

*Exit Hwy 101 going West on Hwy 12.

*Continue on Hwy 12 through Sebastopol.

*After the first signal, it becomes a two-lane street. Stay in the right lane and continue through the next signal.

*Continue on Hwy 12/Bodega Hwy heading west approximately 8 miles.

*Turn **right** on Bohemian Hwy and drive approximately 4.8 miles to Scouts Camp Rd.

*Turn **left** on Scouts Camp Rd. and follow the signs!

(You will be able to see the town of Occidental when you get to Scouts Camp Rd.)

The one way road is a stable but somewhat uneven dirt road. It is best to arrive before dark. There will be signs to guide you all along the way. The regular parking is along the perimeter of the grassy field, next to the pool. After the grassy area, you will cross over a bridge and take an immediate left. There will be a sukkah on the left and cabins on the right, then a fork in the road. To pull down into the regular camp for unloading, take the left fork. You may pull into the camp to unload and then park your vehicle in the regular parking area.

Tent camping is permitted on the grassy area.

Darkness falls early as the site is surrounded by beautiful towering redwood trees that provide majestic scenery as well as a lot of shade. Please remember flash lights and lanterns.
